COUNTY COUNCIL LETTER Mid September 2004



At the beginning of September the Government released a consultation paper proposing a more graduated approach to curbing speeding drivers. With this as background it is worth looking to see where we are in this part of Cambridgeshire regarding traffic calming, speed checks, provision of bridle and cycleways and offers of training now for motor cyclists and later for drivers.

Firstly, <u>traffic calming</u>, a campaign I have encouraged for years, increasingly supported by parish councils and individual petitions to the County. We now have, by common consent, much better driver behaviour in Swaffham Prior, Bottisham and in particular Burwell. Of course, there are idiots in a hurry or lacking consideration for others who spoil the record, for example the drivers who drive the wrong side of the traffic islands at Lode crossroads and the junction of the Al303 and Bell Road, Bottisham.

I have just returned from a Speed Awareness Course in Staffordshire (starting in Cambridgeshire in 12 months' time) and came away with several vivid impressions. Yes, speed kills; we all know that, but are you aware at all times that 95% of pedestrians are killed when hit by a vehicle at 30 mph, whereas 95% of pedestrians survive at 20 mph!

On the course, which is offered to drivers who exceed 30 mph but under 40 mph, there is a morning session of theory and discussion followed by an afternoon driving round Staffordshire with an instructor checking and discussing skills, judgment and habits and so on. My other deep impression from that drive was to practice "COAST" which translates to "Concentration. Observation.and Anticipation gives Space and Time to avoid trouble.

Travelling home on the notorious A5 gave more than enough opportunity to carry out my hitherto rusty skills.

132 Kv Electric transmission line Burwell to Horningsea

A few days after this article goes to your editor a decision will be taken at Shire Hall about whether the County will reverse its holding objection to the proposal to duplicate the power line which runs from <u>Burwell Sub-station</u> through our fens via <u>Reach, Swaffhams & Lode</u> to the junction at Horningsea.

I shall speak to the meeting and tell you what happened next month. Whatever the decision, the County (and involved Districts of E.Cambs and S.Cambs) will only pass on a recommendation. The decision will be taken by the Secretary of State, so we may not know the outcome for some time.

Mrs Richards has been at the school for three years and was part of our successful OfSTED. We wish Mrs Richards well and will be appointing her replacement prior to the half term.

After the birth of her second baby, Rebecca, Mrs Pinhey has decided not to come back after her maternity leave finishes. Mrs Pinhey was our music co-ordinator, but music is still high on the agenda this term, with the school facilitating piano, guitar, violin and cello lessons. Mrs Hodges is teaching class 3 and 4 music and Mrs Pumfrey teaches recorder and supports infant music whilst Mrs Holt leads singing.

Our Harvest service take place 2pm on Friday 8th October at St Mary's. Donations of food can be made to Cambridge Food bank; this year they have also requested donations of recipe books.

We wish good luck to all the Y7s settling in to their new secondary schools.

Notes on the meeting of Reach Parish Council held on Wednesday 4th August 2004

Present

The meeting commenced with the election of officers as follows:

Reports

Swaffham Prior Primary School

Cllr Pearson reported a slight fall in the school roll.

The Deputy Head, Mary Richards, had resigned and would be leaving at Christmas; her replacement would be appointed in the autumn.

Village hall committee

Three quotes had now been tendered for the extension to the village centre.

Matters arising

- The Executive Director of East Cambridgeshire District Council's Legal and Democratic Services, Eleanor Hoggart, had written to say she was willing to obtain counsel's advice on the matter of Reach Parish Council taking over the freehold of The Dyke's End pub from Reach for a Pint Ltd.
- Clerk had arranged with Eastern Highways to cut back the vegetation near the Old Railway Bridge.
- Brian Hicks, the travellers' liaison officer from ECDC had visited the travellers whose horses were still tethered on Blackberry Drove. The travellers themselves were camped on Headlake Drove, which is in Swaffham Prior parish. Mr Hicks said that Swaffham Prior PC was keen to get the family moved but he wanted them to stay as their children were at Bottisham School.
- Clerk had obtained a quote for safety surfacing for the play area.

Correspondence

• The secretary to the Mayor of Cambridge, Sue Edwards, had written concerning the problems of accommodating 20+ vehicles from the City Council on Reach Fair Day. A copy of her letter had been forwarded to Tony Jordan, Chairman of the Village Hall Committee, for his comments.

- Mr Coley of Weirs Farm, Burwell Road, had been given planning permission to build a garage and workshop.
- ECDC were to hold a special parish forum to discuss the council's proposed shortlist of sites for its future office accommodation.
- The East Highways Division of the County Council were to hold their 2005/06 bidding round for the Jointly Funded Minor Highways Improvement. Councillors agreed to put forward a joint proposal with Swaffham Prior to get a path put around the Old Railway Bridge.
- The Hon Gen Sec of GOBA had written about its members having mooring difficulties owing to the long grass and thistles etc. Clerk had contacted the Environment Agency who had agreed to cut back the weed in the water. It was agreed that the grass also needed cutting back.

Reach matters

- Planning application from Dr Maata, Burwell Road, for an outside swimming pool. No objection.
- Planning application from Mr and Mrs Neve for a summer room at the rear of Fair Green Cottages. No objection.
- Ely Treatment Sewerage Works had applied for planning permission to extend the sewerage works on The Hythe. This was 'to upgrade, in order to improve the quality of discharge to the river.' Clerk and Chairman were to meet with the contractor to discuss.

Notes on the meeting of Reach Parish Council meeting held on Wednesday 1st September 2004

Present

Chairman Cllr Robinson, V/Chairman Cllr Aves, Cllrs Summers, Harrison, and Hill; also C/Cllr Fitch.

Reports

County Council

- Cllr Fitch asked if the PC would re-apply for a minor highways grant to have a foot/cyclepath around the Old Railway Bridge. It had been suggested that the PC join force with Swaffham Prior PC; their clerk had said it was unlikely that they would want to. Cllr Fitch said David Groom (Highways Dept) was checking to see if the bridge was still under the jurisdiction of the rail authority.
- The Park and Ride had been granted beacon status. The future of the guided bus was to be discussed at a public enquiry. Bus patronage in Cambridgeshire was ten times higher than the national average, although local buses needed more passengers. 'Use or lose it', commented Cllr Fitch, although he agreed that fares were expensive.
- The vegetation near the Old Railway Bridge had been cut back. Councillors said hedges alongside other local roads needed attention.
- The County Council had been 're-shaped' with three directors and a Chief Executive.

Cllr Fitch referred to a letter from Hilary Almond complaining about the on-going problem of the travellers' horses on Straight Drove, and the unacceptable behaviour of travellers leaving behind human waste in the Whiteway Drove area. Brian Hicks, the Travellers Liaison Officer had been made aware of the situation. The matter was discussed.

Planning applications submitted to the county could now be checked on its website. Only one crime in Reach had been reported to the Police in the last month – that of a smashed security light on Burwell Road.

Three residents of Burwell Road had written to the Highways Department about the lack of signs warning of the dangerous bends. Cllr Fitch asked to have copies of the letters. A discussion about the problem of local roads also included the on-going problem of large lorries getting stuck at the junction of Fair Green and Great Lane. Clerk updated councillors on the current position, i.e. that Greens of Soham (the destination of most of the lorries) had declined to contribute fairly to the cost of signage (organised by CCC) so the matter had been dropped.

District Council

(Cllr Anderson had submitted a written report in his absence).

The councillor had also been following up travellers' issues and reported on it. He also outlined possible sites for the new East Cambridgeshire District Council offices. Matters arising

Counsel had written, via Eleanor Hoggart (District Solicitor), regarding the Parish Council taking on the freehold of The Dyke's End pub. He could see no problems so Councillors agreed the matter could progress.

Correspondence

Hilary Almond re the travellers (see County report).

Grahame Miller had also corresponded with the Clerk on the matter of the travellers' horses. He also commented on the amount of rubbish near the person living on the boat currently moored on The Hythe. It was suggested that the person be advised to take his rubbish up to Fair Green for collection, rather than leaving it near the waste bin at the bottom of The Hythe, where it was unlikely it would be collected.

A small amount of ECDC money was available for replacement/additional signs. It was not thought necessary in Reach at present.

Reach matters

Councillors discussed the poor state of the children's play area at the top of Fair Green. Clerk to see if grants available from East Cambs to put down safely surfacing, which was very expensive.

HARVEST SUPPER

Youth Link ~ July 2004

Young people from the Anglican, Lutheran & Reformed traditions came together again this year for a 12 day stay in Germany at the end of July – for recreation, community work, discussions, worship, and the building of friendships. A group of 40 young people and leaders from Burwell (St Mary's Church) in the Diocese of Ely, Bansin in Germany, and Sarospatak in Hungary met for a second year, following the successful extending of the original Burwell-Bansin link (established over 5 years) to include a third country last summer. (Over several years former Reach resident, Jade Rolph, has taken part in these visits, as also this year.)

A week was spent camping at the Bible Centre in Barth on the coast of the Baltic Sea, with wonderful beaches for swimming and team games, inland lakes close by for sailing and canoeing, and an impressive network of dedicated paths for cycling. In the local "St Marien" church (the size of a small Cathedral) the group was given a special welcome at the Sunday service, and group members were invited to read the gospel each in their own language. Later in the week, members of the group took part in a late-evening candle-lit meditation (translated for our benefit) with Taize songs focusing on different parts of this splendid historic building. During the week, group members undertook cleaning and gardening work at the church, and helped with a number of other practical tasks.

The Bible Centre was first opened in 2001 in a renovated church building adjoining a former leper hospital; its new extension with modern facilities for groups was only opened very recently this Spring – so ours was the first group to stay there. The centre, open to the public, houses an original of the "Barth Bible" dating back to 1588 and many interesting Bible-related exhibits. The Barth Bible, of which only 25 were ever produced, was a translation of the Bible in the regional "lower German" dialect, for the purpose of strengthening the Christian faith in this area. The town of Barth has only one other copy of this special Bible.

During the week, the group visited the site of the former concentration camp at Ravensbruck – originally planned for 30,000 women, but in which were packed 130,000 women plus 20,000 men, many of whom didn't survive the horrors of forced labour, torture, medical experiments and gas chambers. It was a sombre day reminding our young people of the lessons we must learn from the past for world peace today. Another outing was to Berlin, visiting Checkpoint Charlie, seeing the remaining part of the Berlin wall, and reflecting inside the beautiful Kaiser Wilhelm Memorial Church - like Coventry, the original destroyed in the war with a new church built alongside the bombed remains of the old.

The trip was rounded off with 3 days at Bansin, also on the Baltic coast, on the island of Usedom. From here our group visited the former site at Peenemunde, now a museum, where the V1 and V2 rockets were developed (mainly for dropping on London and other parts of SE of England); a burial ground at Golm (now less than a mile from the Polish border) where 23,000 people from the nearby town of Swinemunde are buried from a single allied bombing raid of one hour; and then afterwards we crossed the border to see the town as it is today.

Discussions in the group centred around the lessons we can learn from past conflicts and how we perceive the newly expanded European Union - socially, economically, politically and militarily – particularly with Hungary being one of the "accession countries" having joined the EU earlier this year. We had some interesting and lively discussions on the Iraq war and the differing attitudes of our countries and leaders; and on the last Sunday held a service together on the promenade at Bansin with many passers by joining in.

Of the event group members have said:

- "I've enjoyed these exchanges before and feel it's a great way to get to know new people and improve my knowledge of different cultures." (Ricki Slowe 19)
- "I was keen to learn about life in other countries, to make new friends, and also to improve my German." (Tom Bandy 18)
- "I have learned that young people from other countries are very friendly and easy to get on with, and they are very similar to us in views, opinions and ideas on many subjects." (Janine Taylor 17)
- "I found that others may have different cultures and customs, but we are all just teenagers all the same!" (Sarah Nieber 17)
- "I travelled to Germany because I wanted to meet my new friends whom I got to know last year. I have never been to Germany so far, and I wanted to see this country and practise English and German. I've learned that we have to understand other nations, and we have to live together in peace." (Klara Olah, 21)
- "Despite the fact that we live in different countries, the way we try to solve our problems is much the same, and the way we think about world issues is quite similar." (Emese Bodnar 19)

The visit was another highly successful experience for the young people involved – undoubtedly one of the best yet! We learned so much about our different countries' histories and cultures; enjoyed singing, socializing, worshipping and working together; had a thoroughly good time and made many new friends. It was for many a dismantling of prejudices, as we discovered how much we share in common despite outward differences of language and nationality. I feel the lessons learned will be of help in listening and understanding in all kinds of situations.

All of this year's participants are enthusiastic about joining in another exchange visit next summer when it will be our turn to be host the event. It would be good to have more young people from both Reach and Burwell taking part (who must be between 14-25, preferably in full time education), and the eent will take place in the first fortnight of the summer holidays.

The exchanges are supported with generous grants from the European Union's "Youth for Europe" programme administered by the British Council, as well as some local groups, without whose help they could not take place; and we are most grateful to them all.

Devil's Dyke Restoration



The Project is now just over half way through its five-year period. Below is a brief summary of what has been achieved and what is planned on each of the sections of the Dyke plus a summary of the access improvements and interpretation works planned/completed.

| SECTION | UPDATE |
|-------------------------------------|--|
| Reach to Dismantled Railway Line | Scrub is being cleared from the railway line towards the start of the fenced area at Reach this winter. The fenced area closest to Reach village is having the path widened this winter and more scrub is planned to be removed during winter 2005/06. Exact amounts to be removed could be discussed next summer, before the final clearance phase takes place. |
| Dismantled Railway Line to B1102 | Scrub was cleared last winter and the slopes have just been re-seeded with grasses. A new perimeter fence was installed during September to allow grazing to take place during 2005. |
| B1102 to A14 | Scrub has been cleared during the previous three winters and re-seeding has now been completed. New gates and fences have been installed and grazing is taking place along with mowing to manage the vegetation. |
| A14 to A1303 | Mowing, raking & removal of scattered scrub has been taking place on rotation to manage this excellent area of chalk grassland beside Newmarket racecourse. |
| A1303 to B1061 | New fencing & gates were installed during 2003. The remaining areas of scrub are being cleared this winter. Grazing is planned for 2005. |

Access Improvements:

- 8 new steps and a bridge have now been installed at various points along the Dyke to improve access on the steeper, slippery slopes.
- A series of new oak fingerposts and waymarker posts have been installed.
- 'easy access' gates have been installed where new fences cross the footpath.

Agreement has been reached with the County Council Access Team to ensure that the whole length of the footpath is well maintained.

Interpretation:

A leaflet has been produced & distributed in the area.

7 new interpretation panels are being installed along the site during November (suggestions for a suitable location in Reach welcomed!).

A new website has recently been set up at www.devilsdykeproject.org.uk (please take a look at it!).

A new schools/information pack is being designed for next year.

The project has an on-going programme of events/ guided walks etc to promote the site and the work of the Project.

A Message from Councillor Allen Alderson Rose Cottage, 30 Great Lane, Reach, CB5 0JF



I wish to use this month's newsletter to discuss East Cambs District Councils bid to a new headquarters site.

The Full Council took a step closer to deciding where its new HQ office accommodation should be located by short listing four sites as potentially suitable at its meeting on Tuesday; July 20th.

Three of the four short listed sites had been chosen from a long list of nine locations, which itself was earlier whittled down from an original list of 19 possible locations for the new HQ. The fourth option, a site on the Soham bypass, was added to the list at the meeting.

The selected options which will now go forward for more detailed investigation and assessment are to:

- 1. extensively re-build and re-furbish the Grange
- 2. construct a new building at Cambridgeshire Business Park on Ely's Angel Drove 3. a new building at Lancaster Way Business Park in Witchford
- 4. A new building at Soham bypass

All four potential choices were regarded as preferable because they are immediately available and also had other advantages, and the Council will be conducting a public survey during August and September to gauge the views of the district's residents on each of the short listed sites. This will be followed up with two public meetings, at the Council's offices in Ely on 12th October and Soham Village College on 14th October. There will also be a series of open staff meetings about the proposed move as well as a survey of the staffs opinions about each of the sites.

Chief Executive John Hill said: 'We have gone through a rigorous selection programme to arrive at the shortlist of the best possible sites for further consideration. The four chosen sites each offer different advantages and we now have to examine the fine details before making a final decision.

Uppermost in our minds are the needs and wishes of the residents of our district, as well as the views of the Council's members and staff It is important that we have as much feedback as possible so we can make a correct, fully informed decision. This is a once-in-a-lifetime event and we want to ensure we get it right.'


Office accommodation has been on the Council's agenda for several years, as space at The Grange has become increasingly cramped with more staff having been needed to take up the extra duties imposed by central government and to deal with the expanded operational requirements generated by the district's rapidly growing population.

Withhoffice space limited and resources stretched, the Council needs to decide whether to re-build The Grange to create a more modem and efficient working environment, or whether to seek alternative new accommodation elsewhere.

With the Full Council having now confirmed the four short listed sites, Anther detailed and thorough assessments of each site will take place. A seminar for councillors will be held in October to bearthe results of the assessments into the four sites, followed by two committee meetings to examine the details. The matter will then go to a special meeting of the Full Council meeting on 30th November for a final decision to be made.

The public are entitled to attend the special meeting of the Full Council in November, as well as the preceding meetings of the Overview and Scrutiny committee on 29th October, and the Policy and Resources* committee meeting on 10th November, at which the matter will be debated.

Dear Friends.

DOWN TO EARTH

When you're reading a book which interests you do you sometimes stop at a sentence which also puzzles and arrests you....makes you go back and read it again? Perhaps it's a sentiment you don't understand, or you don't agree with, or whole heartedly DO agree with.

I've just finished a book set in the Australian Outback--"Journey to the Stone Country" by Alex Miller.And I read this sentence spoken by a blackfeller, one with a lot of whitefeller's blood in him:

" There's some things you know without knowing why you know them....and it don't help to try explaining them".

Surprisingly that spoke volumes to me, and I must have spent ten or fifteen minutes just reading over and over again the single paragraph which contained that sentence. It seemed at first a bit like the riddle of the Sphinx! You read it again!

Later while thinking of our Harvest Thanksgivings it occurred to me--that's exactly what harvest and crops and sowing and ploughing the earth are all about...knowing somethingbut how and why?

When you read this Anita and I will be out in Australia, enjoying Spring ...Autumn will have been left behind and we'll be enjoying "Spring in the Valley" (the Swan Valley just north of Perth) and sampling the harvest of the vineries, products of very different soils from our own....and we'll be fascinated again to see different people, particularly the blackfellers and gals, those folk who have, for at least 40,000 years, known things from their Dreamtimes we now don't know about...about living in a hostile environment, valuing and caring for the land which they see as owning us human beings and not we owning the land, and which provides for us all.

And chiefly they are fully aware of, and in tune with, the spiritual world around and within each one of us; and of creation and, above all, their and our Creator.It's for them a very special relationship.Is it such for us?

Our failure to relate to the earth results in our misuse of it. This is exemplified by the deserts we create through our greed and mis-management. When I was a boy ALL the fields around us in Norfolk grew crops, in rotation, with natural animal manures and organic feeding and no chemicals. There was no such thing as a set-aside field, surely an affront to the dignity of the land as well as a denial of the needs of hungry millions in so many continents? (Who but a lot of politicians could have contrived such a situation ?!)

But the Earth is far greater than we mortals are , and always has the last laugh. When we depart this life we are reminded that we are but "earth returning to earth and dust to dust".

In late July 1944, three days after my home and garden in south-east London received a direct hit from a V1 flying bomb and everything, but everything, was flattened , we were digging in the debris to find a few retrievable remains, when my Father thrilled us by shouting out: "The rhubarb's up!". The land was repaying us for the TLC lavished upon it the previous days and weeks, and was bringing forth out of it's grey depths some fruits of the earth .

We are so often staggered by what science tries to teach us from those test tubes, telescopes and the journeys out into space. But our souls are too small to match the feats of our minds. We risk so much when we forget that we're not the Creator of the Earth but the created ones, not the Maker but the users; and when we fail to thank God for the mystery of all life itself.....and we ignore at our peril our indebtedness to the land --the Earth--and the very source of our being.

Do we follow the words that Shakespeare put into the mouth of King Richard 11: "Dear Earth, I do salute thee....." To understand the abiding spirit of that earth we have got to try and steer ourselves gradually away from our western culture, upbringing and training of enquiring into the reasons for everything, searching endlessly for explanations. We must adopt the language of "signs and silence", listening to our soul and discovering what we know deep down, through the music of the spirit of the earh....even though we don't know why or how we know it. We must accept that we are touching upon some deep truth which is long buried in our spirit. The songwriter, Matt Redmond, wrote this:

"I'll bring you more than a song, because a song itself is not what you've required. You search much deeper within than the way things appear. You're looking into my heart".

We must give our thanks for and accept our responsibility for enhancing, enriching and taking care of nature's storehouse, the earth, the source of our homes, our health, our art, our everything. Through God's Grace we have the priviledge of being the custodians of the land for the short time that we pass through this life. Our little excursion here encourages us to believe that this is but a preview of the place we are ultimately heading for on our final journey. That will be exciting beyond belief. And that I know, but do I know why?What do you think?

"Show us your glory, as far as we can grasp it; and shield us from knowing more than we can bear."


