## From the Vicar:

One feels as diffident this December as last about wishing anyone a Happy New Year. It sounds so like a reaningless noise to which people give vent when they don't know what else to say. Nationwise, it is no more likely to be happy than this one has proved. So how do we approach another year without sheer despair? The Christian Gospel still stands despite all contradiction; the words of Christ have not passed away, and still carry their ancient power. Better still, He himself still lives to give them that power; so that life is still possible, and will go on being possible even if, at worst, another Dark Age is really descending upon us.

To be more specific, one of the great restorers of national life is the fostering of community life at the level of the village, and the creation of a journal like 'Out of Reach' can hardly fail to help in that direction. Indeed, one can feel its good effects already. \* One other ingredient, is the fostering of understanding between the denominations, which has made such immense strides, against all expectation, in the last thirty years. To help this along in our own communities we shall be repeating the experiment we tried last year, of a joint meeting of all Christians during the week of prayer for Christian unity (January 18 - 25) on Wednesday the 19th at 8.00p.m. in the School. Mr. Eric Woodroffe, of Isleham, has agreed to talk to us about the Ten Propositions of Visible Unity recently put out by the Churches' Unity Commission. In addition, the Baptists will be joining us for Parish Communion at 9.30a.m. on January 23rd, and Anglicans in turn are invited to join the Baptists at evening worship on that day. J.K. Byrom.

## JANUARY GARDENING ...

Complete digging so that soil may be broken down by the frost. Now is the time to browse through seed catalogues - order early in order not to be disappointed by your favourite varieties being sold out.

Onions may be sown in boxes in the greenhouse to produce large exhibition bulbs.

Sprinkle a little salt on Savoy cabbage, and sprouts, during a frosty spell; this helps to stop rot setting in.

Towards the end of the month, set up early seed potatoes to sprout - rose end upwards.

Shallots can be planted if soil is in good condition, otherwise wait a while. Bulbs about 1" down are best.

Perhaps it is not generally known large bulbs can be cut in halves.

## RECIPES

## TOMATO FLAN

Shortcrust pastry case, baked blind, at 400°F. for 20 mins.

Filling: (quantities for 10" flan)

 $1\frac{1}{2}$  lb. onions

2 level thsp. tomato paste

l clove garlic (or garlic powder)

1 level tsp. mixed herbs

6 tbsp. oil

Salt and pepper

14 oz. can tomatoes

Anchovies (if liked)

Peel and finely slice onions, crush garlic and saute gently in the oil until soft.

Drain tomatoes and stir into onion mixture with tomato paste, herbs and seasonings.

Cook gently for 5 mins.

Turn into freshly baked flan case, garnishing with anchovies if liked. (Flan may be frozen at this stage for later use, in which case it will need  $3\frac{1}{2}$  hours at room temperature to thaw before cooking). Brush flan with cil and cook at 375°F. for 30 mins.

3 oz. soft brown sugar 6 oz. rolled oats

Oven temp. 375°F. (Gas Mark 5)

Cream marg. and sugar until light and fluffy.

Stir in walnuts and oats.

Press mixture into a greased, shallow tin (11" x 7") and pat flat. Bake for 25 mins. until top is pale golden brown. Mark into pieces while still hot and leave to cool in the tin.
