PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Plans have been received by the Council for work already undertaken at the Dykes End public house, and for an illuminated sign. The Parish Council hopes that any difficulties will now be resolved.

Numerous complaints have been received about unnecessary mud left on the roads in the centre of the village by local lorries and tractors. Would the farmers responsible please try to avoid this in future?

A letter has been sent to Mr. Kisby of the County of Cambs. asking for the hedge near Mr. Medlicott's to be cut back.

There has been a small response to the 'Question and Answer Time' at Parish Council meetings. It is hoped that more people will take advantage of it.

Requests have been made for the Mobile Library to make an extra stop at Ditchfield. Would those interested please make themselves known to the Parish Council?

SHIRE HALL TITBITS

The rates situation in Cambridgeshire is far worse than even pessimistic forecasts. The County Council is certain to demand more cash from our ratepayers as a result of the Government decision to transfer resources from counties like Cambridgeshire to the major urban areas. One can have some sympathy for this policy, BUT rural areas, notably Cambridgeshire, have been specially heavily 'clobbered'.

In Mr. Shore's words the policy should have resulted in an average domestic rate increase "of not greater than 15%", I (being closely involved) estimate that, even after severe economies have been made at county level, Reach ratepayers will be fortunate to get away with less than a 30% increase. Clearly this means that, if Mr. Shore is correct, some areas will have no increase at all. Is this fair?

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FEBRUARY IN YOUR GARDEN

Month for tidying up. Repair trelkices etc. Prune fruit trees, spray with tar while buds are dormant.

Rose bushes can be sprayed with Jeyes Fluid (5 tbsp. to 1 gall. water) for protection against 'Black spot'. Also spray ground around bushes to kill spores (1 tbsp. to 1 gall. water). Be careful to keep way from tender plants.

Sow parsnips towards end of month if soil is in good condition, as they need a long growing season.

Sow round seed varieties of peas like 'Felthams First'.

Sow main crop of Broad Beans.

Plant shallots.

Give lawns a stiff brushing and dress with lawn sand to kill moss.

Gardening in a nut shell. Treat your garden like your baby. Nourish well. Keep its face clean and its bottom dirty.

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REACH VILLAGE CENTRE

Conditions of Hire

- Application for the hire of the Reach Village Centre must be in writing on the enclosed form and sent on completion to The Treasurer, Mrs. Folkes, 8 Great Lane, Reach. The scale of charges and hours of letting are set out on the enclosed sheet. A deposit of 25% of the total charges payable is due with the application form for individual, and outside organisations at the discretion of the Committee, and balance must be paid at least 48 hours before commencement of the hiring for this group. A new scale of charges will operate with effect from 1st December 1976; after this date, 3 months notice will be given of any revised charges.
- 2. The hirer may cancel a booking upon giving fourteen day's notice in writing. If a hiring is cancelled within fourteen days of the date of the hiring the deposit will be forfeited. The Committee reserve the right by notice to the hirer any monies paid by way of deposit, but the Committee shall not be under any liability to the hirer for any loss or damage he may sustain arising out of such termination.
- The capacity of people allowed in the Centre for stage shows or the like is 85, and for a dance where the only seating provided is around the walls of the Hall, the number allowed in must not exceed 100.
- No excisable liquor shall be sold unless an occasional licence has been obtained by the hirer or on his behalf, and the hirer shall ensure that any conditions of such licence be complied with.
- The hirer shall provide such number of attendants and stewards as may be necessary to secure the efficient supervision of the premises during the hiring, including:
 - the orderly and safe admission and departure of persons to and from the premises, and the orderly and safe clearance of the premises in case of emergency;
 - the safety of the premises and preservation of good order and decency therein;
 - ensuring that all doors giving egress from the premises are kept unfastened, and unobstructed, and immediately available for exit during the whole time the premises are in use; and

wearing of footwear of any kind which is liable to cause damage to floors will be prohibited.

By law, 2 stewards are required. If no stewards available - Hall stewards can be made available to the hirer at £1 per hour each.

- 6. When the premises are hired for the purpose of auction sales, horticultural shows, or other events of a like nature, the hirer must protect the floor of the main hall with a suitable covering.
- 7. No nail or fastening of any kind shall be driven or put into any wall, partition, pillar, or other fittings or furniture. The Committee have provided at various points in the main hall a number of screws and hooks to which decorations may be fixed. The caretaker will indicate these to any hirer.
- 8. The hirer shall repay to the Committee on demand the cost of reinstating or replacing, or repairing any part or parts of the property (which includes all property owned by the Centre, e.g. Crockery), and any of the furniture and fittings which shall be damaged, destroyed, stolen or removed as a result of the negligence of the hirer during the period of the hire.
- 9. The hirer shall indemnify the Committee against all claims, demands, actions or proceedings in respect of any loss, damage or injury caused of or to any person which shall occur while such person is in or upon part of the property or in respect of any loss or damage suffered or sustained by any person by reason of use of the property by the hirer.
- 10. The Committee reserve unto themselves and their officers, servants and agents a right of entry to every part of the premises at any time when duly authorised so to enter.
- The hirer must not inconvenience the neighbouring people, or their properties in any way.
- 12. The hirer is responsible for obtaining necessary theatrical licences and complying with Performing Rights Society Regulations, and all Police and Fire Regulations.

13a. For Sunday hiring - it must be understood that the Church takes priority over any other bookings.

Limitations of Times of Hire

Music and entertainment must not continue after the hours shown below.

Friday nights

12.30 a.m.

Saturday "

11.45 p.m. (hall cleared)

Sunday

10.00 p.m.

The Hall should be vacated 1 hour after these times - except as stated.

- Keys can be obtained from Mrs. Folkes, 8 Great Lane, Reach. 14. Keys must be returned immediately after period of hire. All keys during hire are the responsibility of the hirer.
- Caretaker (Mr. Ray Folkes, 8 Great Lane, Reach.) It is expected that all hirers will leave the Hall clean and tidy. A charge of £5 will be made to the hirer - if the Hall is not left in a satisfactory condition - at Caretaker's discretion.
- 16. Kitchen Use of the kitchen is not restricted on private bookings - (e.g. Weddings, private parties, etc.) The Hall committee reserves the right to do the catering at any public functions for private gain, in agreement with the hirer; proceeds to go to Hall funds. Should this option not be taken up a charge will be made to the hirer for the use of the kitchen and its contents.

All food and drink sold for consumption on the premises must either have been prepared in or sold from the Hall kitchen.
