

Welcome to the ancient kingdom of Reach, Cambridgeshire, England



The ancient Township of REACH, or RECHE, has been inhabited for 2,000 years. Local legend says that it was once a city boasting seven churches! Situated at the termination of the great earthwork known as the Devil's Dyke, with Reach Lode giving direct access to the sea, it survived the Conquest as an inland port. It was the centre of considerable trade in mediaeval times, being granted a charter to hold an annual fair at Rogationtide by King John. Later, as the activity on its hythes decreased and its maritime importance declined, Reach, with its great fair dwindling to the proportions of a village 'feast' and its many inns closing one by one, gradually lapsed into a purely agricultural community. Reche the port has gone, only Reach the hamlet remains.

Church News



FROM THE VICAR, REVD CANON STEPHEN EARL.

Dear Friends,

This summer marks the 10th anniversary of the friendship link between our parish and the Lutheran Church of Bansin in Germany. Bansin is a beautiful seaside resort on the Island of Usedom in the Baltic Sea, just off mainland Germany and close to the Poland border. Each year, through our exchange visits, a great many young people and adults have benefited as participants, hosts, supporters, and in meeting our friends - at services, shared meals, and on outings.

For this special year, we have two separate visits in each other's countries. Back in June it was a great pleasure to offer hospitality here to a group of 10 adults and 1 youngster, with a programme laid on for them locally, as well as a visit to London (including St Paul's Cathedral). In Cambridge the group enjoyed a rare chance to walk along the roof void above the stone vaulting of King's College Chapel, and at Ely Cathedral the group experienced pilgrimage and lantern tours, after which we stayed for Evensong at which their Pastor and I read the lessons. Earlier that afternoon Bishop Anthony and his wife Sheila laid on a wonderful tea for us, and showed our visitors their wonderful house and gardens - Bishop Anthony has followed our link with much interest over the years, among the most successful in the diocese. Other trips included Bury St Edmunds, Newmarket, Saffron Walden, and our own splendid museum in Burwell.

The highlight of their visit was the Lutheran Eucharist at St Mary's Burwell in which Pastor Peter Nieber preached and presided at Holy Communion (under the Meissen Agreement between the Anglican & Lutheran Churches) in near-perfect English! In his sermon Peter gave us the ingenious illustration of a boat crossing the North Sea and arriving Jesus Lock in Cambridge as an image of our journeying through life and arriving at the gateway to heaven! So in the afternoon we took a river-boat outing on the Cam from Fen Ditton to Jesus Lock. The most moving moment surely was when Norman Sibbons, who fought in the Second World War, presented to each of the German group a beautiful wooden cross he had made, and to Peter a further large cross in oak for the church in Bansin, as a symbol of peace and friendship. I'll not forget that very special moment.

In August the next visit takes place in Germany: with young people from Burwell, Bansin, and also our other link church, a Reformed Church in the historic town of Sàrospatak in Hungary with whom we celebrate a 5th anniversary of friendship this year... 45 people (13 youth from each country and 2 leaders) will be camping at Trassenheide on the Island of Usedom, visiting places of interest and

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A Message from your District Councillor

We should all welcome the news that our Post Office at Swaffham Bulbeck is not included in the latest list of closures. We can all play a part in its viability; it really is a case of USE IT or LOSE IT. The Post Office and local stores provide an important service for many local community members, particularly the elderly and those without transport.

The inclusion of the bag for plastic bottles in the re-cycling round is proving to be a success and is being much used. Following my request, further parts of the Fen area in the Ward are being included.

East Cambs District Council operates an assisted lift scheme for those elderly or disabled people who experience difficulty in putting out their refuse or recyclables for collection. Anybody wishing to participate in the scheme should contact Waste Management Service at ECDC for further information.

The first round of the process to find a new company to run The Maltings, the historic centre for conferences, exhibitions and banquets in Ely, has been completed with seven contenders being short-listed for the next stage. These companies, which were unanimously agreed at a Policy and Resources Committee meeting, will now have 50 days to submit their full tender for a final decision to be made so that the building can re-open later this year. The Cinema will re-open as part of the contract.

Ely's Jubilee Gardens has, for the fourth year in a row, won a prestigious Green Flag award for being amongst the best parks and green spaces in the Country. Opened in 2002 by Prince Philip to mark HM The Queen's Jubilee, the gardens were judged to be welcoming and well maintained with the support and involvement of the local community.

Oliver Cromwell's House in Ely showed further improvements through 2007/8. There were an additional 5,500 visitors to its Tourist Information Centre; higher admission attendances; a 50% increase in guided tour income and also an increase in profit on retails sales of 15%

The school year has ended with a flourish. The fabulous performance of Robin Hood really made the end of year special and the children really performed well. The singing was fabulous and the acting splendid. We are already thinking about what we will do next year!

The children in Years 5 and 6 had an action packed residential trip to the Mepal Outdoor Centre. They took part in a variety of activities including rock climbing, sailing, kayaking, snorkelling, archery and orienteering. The children managed to overcome their fears and get stuck into all of the activities with enthusiasm. They were certainly tired when they got home!

We have had a very sporting half term with all of the children being involved in a variety of sports. We had our Sports Day in June and it was a lovely day. We took the theme of the Beijing Olympics with many of the events having a Chinese theme. The Year 2 children took part in a Multiskills festival at Bottisham Village College, where they tried a variety of different games. All of Key Stage 2 went off to Ely to take part in the very first Youth Games. They competed against other schools in the sports of Hockey, Cricket, Tag Rugby and Netball. Finally we sent a team of year 5/6 children off to Netherhall School to compete in a Basket ball tournament. They did very well, coming 5th out of thirteen teams.

Raising money for our new swimming pool has gone extremely well this year, thank you very much for all of the village support. We are at the stage where we will hopefully be able to have the pool installed in February next year, ready for use next summer. The whole school took part in a sponsored swim event in June to help raise further funds. The children set themselves a swimming target and we took them all to Bottisham pool, where they were able to achieve their swimming goal. It was a really good morning.

The whole school went on a visit to Wisbech on Monday 7th July. We went to take part in a Children's Our World Festival to develop the children's understanding of the multi-cultural world we live in. They saw lots of exciting things including, Bhangra dancers, Indian story tellers, Samba dancers, Romany caravans and Polish dancing. Many of them have been trying out the moves at school!

We are continuing to work hard to achieve the targets set in our school Travel Plan. The bus service that the children use from Reach is certainly very popular and has definitely cut down on the number of cass being used in the mornings. Our Walk on a Wednesday scheme is very popular with nearly the whole school getting their achievement badge each month.

Grants available for capital projects from the Donarbon Community Fund

If you are a not for profit organisation looking for grant funding for a capital project, you may be eligible to apply for a grant from the Donarbon Community Fund.

The Donarbon Community Fund, managed by the Cambridgeshire Community Foundation manages, receives landfill tax credits from Donarbon Waste Management and uses the money to make grants under set criteria.

The Donarbon Community Fund will fund projects in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough that are within 10 miles of a Landfill site.

Grants are available for the following projects

- •The provision, maintenance or improvement of a public park or other gen eral public amenity
- •The conservation of a specific species or a specific habitat where it naturally occurs
- •The repair, maintenance or restoration of a place of worship or a place of architectural importance

Grants will normally be for up to £20,000, although in exceptional circumstances, support to projects may be offered at a higher level.

If you wish to apply for a grant you need to be able to contribute 10% of the value of the grant you are seeking.

The first stage to access a grant is to complete an expression of interest form. This form, along with guidance notes and more general information can be obtained from the Cambridgeshire Community Foundation (01223 421588) www.cambscf.org.uk. The panel who will meet to consider grant requests meets on a quarterly basis in early July, October, January and April.

There are some tough feelings to deal with here such as guilt, resentment, frustration, bitterness and anger to name but a few. Not only that, but sheer physical exhaustion can leave you feeling completely drained – as if you are running on empty with no resources left.

Here are some practical tips:

• Don't lose your identity. You may be a carer but you are also a person in your own right. Keep your own interests and hobbies going

it will help to keep things in perspective.
It is not selfish to be self indulgent. Give yourself plenty of small treats that will recharge your batteries – you will then be able to give more back to those who are relying on you.

Focus on activities that you can both enjoy – it may be something as simple as watching a TV programme together.
You will get a tremendous boost once you realise that you don't have to struggle on alone. Network like mad. Talking to friends and family will help to share the load.

Look out for the professional help available for your situation and don't be afraid to ask for it. There are local support groups around which have been specially set up to support carers such as those run by Crossroads (www.crossroads.org.uk).

Relate is somewhere you can turn to for help and support - our counsellors are trained to deal with many different types of relationship problems. So don't want until things get on top of you - if your relationship is under pressure, and you need someone to talk to, then call us at 01223 357424 to find out more about how we can help you.

Want to do a sponsored cycle ride?

PS it will start in Cornwall and end in Swaffham Prior

"You must be joking." "No way". "You don't mean St Austell in Cornwall?" "I would love to but my knees/work/kids/time" Such were the responses to the suggestion of taking part in a 300 mile cycle ride to raise money for the swimming pool appeal. Undeterred, an 'open meeting' was planned. Present: two very keen women, one realist ("we are no longer in our 20's you know!"), one considered, quiet one who looked as though he could be persuaded to join in and one 'not so quiet' type with a 'have a go' attitude. Plus 2 supporters! Within an hour the 5 had committed themselves to the event. But thank goodness for the realist - he had proposed that rather than cycle 100 miles a day we should make it a relay event: cycle 3 hours, rest 3 hours; repeat for 2 or 3 days and we would make it and only need a day off work. Great idea. We left with the intention of meeting in the pub to refine the plan!

Two other people joined. The Saddle Sore Seven was formed. Training started – randomly. Mandy was seen most mornings racing through the fens at dawn. Graham cycled to Cambridge everyday and terrified us all with his fitness levels. Andy, it emerged, had a history of cycle events, regularly visited the gym and on his first outing covered 50 miles. Phil – well lets just say he never got to any meetings because he was so busy training! That left Adam, Tim and myself cycling less than we had planned and worrying about fitness levels. Then Tim got fit, so that just left two of us worrying. But the miles clocked up and, optimiscally, we set a date.

Day 1: It's a long drive to Cornwall. (Once the alarm clocks had gone off) we left for St Austell on a Saturday morning at 7am, and by 2pm team A were on their bikes leaving the Eden project in a blaze of glory – and light rain! We arranged to meet them 50 miles down the route at 5pm. But the fen training had not prepared us well for Cornwall! We swopped at 30 miles, team A feeling euphoric and tired and team B slightly nervous. Team B set of slowly. We had anticipated the hills would slow us down – but that was the uphill bit. We hadn't reckoned on the downhill bit being quite so scarey! Average mph was down. The rains set in. Dusk approached. We were 20 miles short of our target miles and our hotel in Exeter when we stopped, loaded the cars and drove to the hotel. We just made last orders in the restaurant; sat down to eat at 10pm, (steaks and beers then helped reformulate the plan) and at 11pm were unloading bikes and locking them into sheds. A long day 340 miles in a car and another 85 on bikes.

Day 2: at 6am team A went back to the point where we finished the previous night and team B set out from the hotel. The new plan went into action. No time for 3 hour rests. We played 'leapfrog': team A drove to a village, abandoned the cars, hid the keys and started cycling. When team B reached the cars they jumped in (after a leisurely cup of tea and a chunk of Mandy's mums fruit cake!) drove for 50 miles, abandonded the cars, hid the keys and started cycling. Dog village, Honiton, Rapps, Castle Cary, Frome, Westbury, Goring, Wallingford, and finally Watlington (just south of Oxford).....our goal for the day. We just made it by dusk. 170 miles. We had all spent around 7 hours in the saddle. But it was 9pm – we needed to find our hotel and more importantly food! (The cycle computer was showing a consumption of 1300 calories for the day!) Food orders were phoned ahead. Once again we sat down to eat at 10pm (but this time still in cycle shorts and some still covered in oil!) and once again were sorting out bikes at 11pm. But this time we were even more tired......

Day 3. The end in sight. No hills! Easy peasy lemon squeezy – if it had not been for the north-easterly head wind! Thank goodness we knew bout 'drafting'. We continued the leapfrog strategy from Watlington across Bedfordshire and into the fens.

An interview with Juliet Vickery, World Triathlete Champion By Charlotte and Emily Gillard

After many years of dedicated training, Juliet won the National, European and World Triathlon Age Group Championships this year, she shared some of the secrets of her success with us.

What's a triathlon?

A triathlon is a race where you have to swim 1.5 km through open water in a wetsuit, bike 40 km and then run 10 km.



How old were you when you became interested in triathlons?

I was 34 when I became interested in triathlons, before that I ran at Oxford University.

How did you get started in triathlons?

A friend organised a fun triathlon and invited me. I swam breaststroke with my head out of the water and I had a basket on the front of my bike! Then after that I got hooked.

How often do you go training?

Usually twice a day, in the winter I train for 11-13 hours a week and in the summer fewer hours but higher intensity to save a bit for the races

What do you do when you train?

Pretty much what i do when to ace - swim bike and run really! In the winter I do weights as well. I am lucky to be able to train with people who are faster than me - a good way to make you work hard.

What's your most unusual training session?

Spending friday evenings swimming in a murky lake on the edge of the A14 and having to pay for it!

How do you keep healthy?

Obviously the training helps but I try to eat healthily (though I do love chocolate) and not get too tired.

What keeps you going in a race?

Crossing the finish line and knowing that I've done my best.

What is your favourite sport in triathlon and why?

Running is my favourite because it is my greatest strength.

Which sport do you find the hardest and why?

Cycling because it takes so much time to train to be able to race 40km.

How did it feel to win the gold medal in the World Championships?

At first I did not believe it and then when I heard my name on the speaker I burst into tears.

What do you plan to do next?

I plan to get faster and defend my titles.

Is there anything else you would like to say?

I couldn't have done any of this on my own. I am lucky to have a wonderfully supportive (and very tolerant!) husband and daughter and a very special circle of friends who have helped enormously over the years. Thanks to you all!

Reach Youngsters Sponsored Triathlon (June 2008)

Not to be out done by their parents, in terms of fund raising efforts, many of the youngsters of Reach embarked on a bit of cycling to raise money too – the difference being that for them the biking was immediately preceded by a swim and followed by a run and it all took place in or around Bottisham pool. A sponsored triathlon was the idea of Freya Thomas and Anya Tabecki and between them they persuaded 8 other Swaffham Prior pupils living in Reach to take part. Each set themselves their own target for number of lengths of the pool and laps of the field cycling or running. They embarked on the challenge with enthusiasm and determination. It poured with rain the entire morning but, despite the awful weather, they cycled and ran round and round Bottisham field getting soaked to the skin but smiling all the way. Actually many of the equally soaked parents watching began to look a little anxious as the laps mounted in number. Many of us had severely under estimated our child's ability and sponsored rather generously per length/lap! In all they raised a fantastic £345.00. Special mention to Sophie Bell for raising over £100.00, to Ben Snaith for out lasting us all in stamina and to Freya and Anya for organising the whole event.

For two of the Reach triathletes this sponsored event was just a warm up for one of the biggest junior triathlons in the country the Rob McLean Junior Triathlon hosted by the Cambridge Tri Club (CTC) at Impington Village College. Ben Snaith and Gwilym Davies are both members of CTC and regular competitors at the event. Distances vary between age groups and for 12 year old Ben, competing for the 5th time in this race, this meant he had to race in the 13-14 year age group (groups are based on age at the end of the year) so he was up against older and strong boys. But Ben is the sort of athlete that does not complain at a challenge but meets it head on and for someone his age 300m of swimming 6km of cycling (on grass) and 2.4km of running is a seriously long way. He completed this in just 36mins 13 seconds. He moved up the field in the run, his strongest discipline completing 2.4km in just over 12mins (Ben represented Bottisham Village College in the country cross country in January). Gwilym had age on his side in that he could remain at a tough but slightly shorter distances of 200m, 4km, 1.8km. For him the challenge was to beat his previous times and he did that in style completing the event in 27mins 38seconds - 5mins 19 secs faster than in 2007. Though for Gwilym the swim is his strongest discipline (taking just 3mins 25 secs for 8 lengths) he made the biggest improvement on the bike. I asked them why, like me, they keep going back from more. Gwilym said he loves the challenge of all three sports and Ben 'I just want to get faster'. I fear it won't be long before I can no longer claim to be the fastest triathlete in the village!

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Fantastically well done to both of them!
