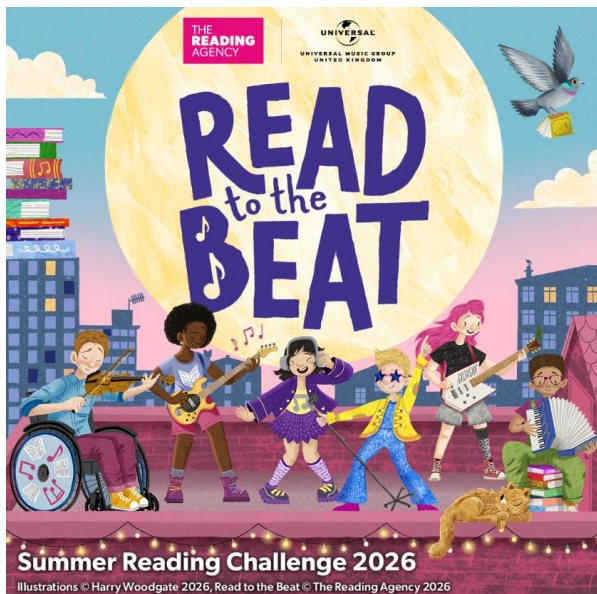
Village Update

MP Update



On 4 July 2026, I marked two years since being elected as your Member of Parliament. It remains a huge privilege to represent the constituency of Ely and East Cambridgeshire and I continue working hard to stay visible, accessible and focused on the issues that matter locally.

Since my election, I have closed more than 17,500 cases where constituents have come to me for help, advice or information. Housing remains the most common concern, followed by roads and support for children with special educational needs and disabilities. I have also helped residents with NHS services, buses, planning, HMRC and visa applications.

I have now held 55 surgeries across the constituency and seven community meetings, giving residents the chance to speak to me directly. My recent meeting in Bottisham was particularly well attended, with lively discussions on bus services, council tax, school funding, gambling and the horseracing industry. Thank you to everyone who came along and shared their views. My next community meeting will take place in Ely in the autumn.

In Parliament, I have spoken in debates and pressed the Government on your behalf, both in person and in writing, about issues affecting our communities. These have included limited access to local NHS services, such as dentistry and GP appointments, the need for fairer funding for Cambridgeshire's roads, the urgent need to improve SEND provision, the protection of our chalk streams and safety concerns surrounding battery energy storage systems associated with solar farms.

I have also met ministers directly to raise a wide range of local concerns. In one case, I arranged for a constituent to meet a minister in person to discuss the urgent need to remove asbestos from public buildings. Alongside this work, I have continued to speak up for the farmers who produce the food we need and the local businesses that create jobs and drive our economy forward.

Better connectivity remains another major priority. Too many residents still struggle with poor mobile phone signals, unreliable broadband and public transport that does not meet the needs of our rural communities. I will continue pressing for the investment and improvements our area deserves.

Although Parliament is entering its summer recess, my local work continues. I will be meeting residents, businesses, charities and community organisations throughout the summer. Staying in regular contact with local people ensures that their experiences and priorities shape how I represent our area in Westminster.

Neighbourhood Watch

Neighbourhood Watch has been developing in recent years. Not only have we acquired a new logo, but there is now a much greater emphasis on community engagement. When Neighbourhood Watch got started in the UK over 40 years ago, there was no need to encourage people to engage with their neighbours. It was the norm to be regularly chatting over the back garden fence and to stop and chat in the street. Now when neighbours go dashing past in their cars it is not so convenient. Now it often needs a different approach e.g. getting people together, for say, a coffee and a chat and it can be surprising what a difference it makes for some people.

Social media has a roll to play, but it is not the be-all and end-all. I recall a cartoon in the paper some years ago. It was a funeral scene - and the coffin was entering the chapel and just two people sitting in the seats. One turned to the other and said "but he had 400 friends on Facebook!"

Keeping a watchful eye out and reporting suspicious activities to the police, or to the council where appropriate, is still part and parcel of what we are about. So many times, someone will walk past and say "tut – tut that would not happen in my day." It would be much better to report it. And reporting it on Facebook is not sufficient – it doesn't cut the mustard.

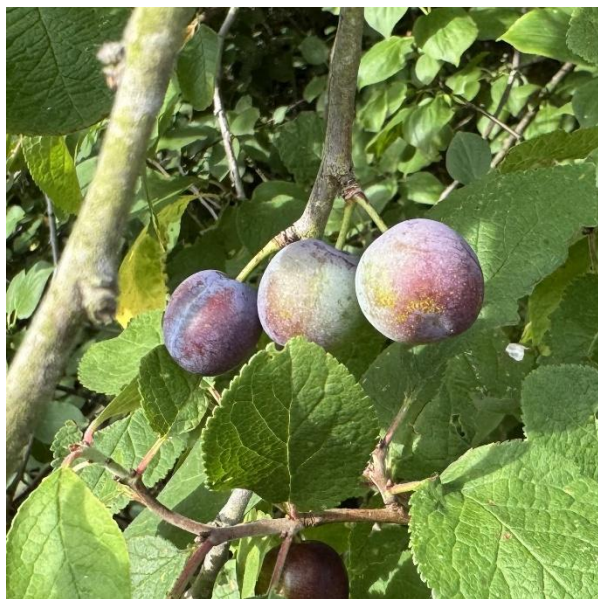

The Swaffhams' Women's Independent Group (SWIG)

In 1971, the overland route to India was opening up and the 'hippie trail' was making its way through Turkey, Iran and Afghanistan. A road off the beaten track promising wonder and excitement. The late 60s, 70s and even early 80s were times when almost anything was possible for many young people.

It was a time of The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, Bowie. There was Woodstock, Mary Quant and Biba. After the miniskirt came flared trousers, platform shoes and then punk rock. Alastair travelled the hippie trail and without realising it, started gathering inspiration for the characters and places in his book. Alastair also talked about the trials and tribulations of 'self-publishing'. After much rewriting and money spent on a copy editor, plus coping with any copyright problems, having the cover design brought to life, setting up an email address and website dedicated to the book, the excitement of finally holding a copy of the book in his hands was immeasurable. Then came the issue of spreading the word about the book! Alastair donates half the money he receives for each copy of the book to the Malala Fund, which is dedicated to supporting young girls and women in education in Afghanistan. A highly entertaining and inspiring talk.

Events in Reach on Saturday 5th September 2026



Nature in Reach

The dry and hot weather that characterised the first half of 2026 has continued. All manner of records are being broken and the Met Office has stated *'What we used to think of as extreme, we increasingly consider as normal, we are right now living in a time of historic and unprecedented change and in terms of temperature, on annual, seasonal, monthly and daily timescales, (the) evidence shows the climate of the 20th Century has now gone'*.



Most processes in nature are closely linked to climate. Many species will struggle to adapt to this pace of change and the increased frequency of extreme weather events. A few, however, will find opportunities to benefit. One such example is the little egret. Milder winters have enabled the bird rapidly to re-colonize the UK from the mid-1980s and to resume breeding in our area.

Sightings Log

4 June: a great spotted woodpecker flies over the Hythe, a buzzard rides the morning thermals over Tubney Fen.

5 June: Rosie Almond reports *'Just had a funny and very close encounter with a stoat near Reach Wood - it clearly hadn't seen me or Archie and came running along the path right up to his nose (he was also preoccupied sniffing a bush)'*

10 June: Janet Hall mentions that a blackcap pair has raised a large brood within one of her fruit cages which offered protection from predators.

Jonathan Latchford reports seeing a water vole in the Catchwater at the bottom of his garden, his first such sighting for some time.

Michael Allen says that two jackdaws have fledged from a nest under the eaves of the chapel. They remained stubbornly flightless for some time despite frequent scolding from their parents.

14 June: a lesser whitethroat calls from the scrub that covers the chalk 'cliffs' at Reach Wood. Locally this species seems to favour scrub on the thinnest of soils.

15 June: a meadow pipit and a corn bunting are heard and seen on Tubney Fen. A cuckoo is heard and seen at the very top of the hedgerow that bounds then Pocket Park.

16 June: two sightings of great spotted woodpeckers on the Hythe (again) and on a bird feeder at Claire Halpin's stable.

18 June: yellowhammer and common whitethroat call from shrubs on the edge of the field adjoining Straight Drove which is currently lying fallow.

29 June: a falcon circles among clusters of swifts above the village. The swifts appear unperturbed. The falcon is too high to identify without binoculars but is probably a hobby. A fledgling great tit shows curiosity and no fear as I weed in our garden.

7 July: Mark Peck, Chair of the Wicken Fen Bird Ringing Group, reveals that his team had ringed a brood of little owls raised in the woodyard on Little Fen Drove. Hilary Fielding mentions that she used to see little owls in the vicinity of Swan Lake and wonders if they are related.



8 July: Jonathan spots a large grass snake swimming in the Catchwater.

Mid July: Graham Lingley reports the presence of two wren fledglings in his garden. He believes that they came from a nest in ivy that cloaks his garden wall.

Steve Boreham has produced reports on plant biodiversity enhancements undertaken in recent years around the village:

At Reach Wood meadow, Steve concludes:

"The good news is that whilst overall biodiversity has declined a little over the last couple of years, the number of introduced established wildflower species has remained steady at around 13.

This means that the biodiversity of the test area appears to have been permanently uplifted



I would have to say that this experiment has been a success and that it offers a proof of concept that autumn wildflower seed sowing really can enhance the biodiversity of meadow areas”.

At the cemetery Steve reports:

“Although plant biodiversity was a little lower last year and this year than in the period 2022 - 2024, there is still considerable value in the un-mown parts of the Cemetery.

Unfortunately, I did not record any bee orchids this year. From what I understand of this species, it can be very fickle, suddenly springing up when conditions are right after not flowering for several years.

I can't be sure that the lower species numbers are due to dry conditions this spring and summer, but I'm sure that it can't have helped.'

On the Catchwater banks Steve states:

“In 2023 we planted a wildflower mix at two locations on the lode bank after the IDB decided to remove the accumulated sediment.

I have been recording the species present each year since. I may not have captured everything of course.

In one area, five of the species in the wildflower mix have become established. At the other it is only two species.

Ox-eye Daisy and Knapweed are two of the most visible successes.

The initial uptick in plant biodiversity after sowing (30-35 species) was not maintained in subsequent years.

However, both areas have maintained 22-25 plant species in the last two years.

I am still amazed by the ‘churn’ between years, with species being lost and others appearing for the first time.

The biodiversity of the areas that we raked and sowed seems to be remarkably good compared to the somewhat monotonous banks of nettle, mugwort and burdock elsewhere”.

19 July: there is a field of fennel that comes to the roadside in Lower End, Swaffham Prior. The plants are a fine sight and on a hot evening, the aromatic scent they produce is striking - strong enough to be picked up in a passing car.

20 July: a red kite flies low out of the tall hedgerow that borders the willow avenue by Tubney Fen. It is an opportunity to view the bird's creamy yellow head and variable plumage close-up. In the past, this location harboured a buzzard nest but no longer. Kites are perhaps squeezing buzzards out of territories around the village.

22 July: Charles Moseley mails to say that a *‘flamboyant Jersey Tiger moth greeted me in the garden (this) morning. What a delight!’*

Throughout this period, I am amazed at the abundance of butterflies and dragonflies around the village. For example, the drifts of scabious and knapweed by the footpath from Reach Wood to the allotments are awash with marbled white, meadow brown, red admiral and peacock butterflies and there is an occasional presence of a comma or painted lady. I assume that this year's warm dry conditions have contributed to the increase - but what appears to be a year on year improvement in insect numbers suggests other factors are at work. The most obvious would be the increasing number of fields around the village that are no longer under intensive arable production and thus free of insecticide and full of the plant species on which insects depend. Graham also comments on the presence of large numbers of butterflies at the Reach solar farm - *brown ones (mostly gatekeepers), small blue ones (never settle so could not ID definitively) and lots of white ones, as well as the usual peacocks and admirals.* He encourages people to take part in the Big Butterfly Count <https://bigbutterflycount.butterfly-conservation.org/> which runs until 9 August and will assist in working out whether the bigger picture for butterfly populations reflects what appears to be happening in Reach.

Finally, I wanted to observe a marked decline of collared doves around the village. There could be several possible reasons for this including trichomonosis, a virulent parasitic disease, which has heavily impacted greenfinches and chaffinches locally and competition from growing numbers of wood pigeons which put pressure on shared food sources and garden territories. Sparrowhawk predation may also have played a role.

Burwell Surgery Patient Participation Group

Community Diagnostic Centre and Minor Injuries Unit at Princess of Wales Hospital, Ely

The PPG thought it would be useful to share some information on the services available to Burwell Surgery patients at the Princess of Wales Hospital site in Ely (Lynn Road, Ely, CB6 1DN).

Ely Community Diagnostic Centre (CDC)

The Ely CDC opened in 2024 and enables patients to access **planned diagnostic care** closer to home without the need to travel to Addenbrooke's or another acute hospital site. There is plentiful, **free parking** including a new multi-storey car park and the **CDC is open 8am to 8pm (blood tests available 8.10am to 4.30 pm)**. The CDC currently provides the following diagnostic services (other services are planned for later in the year):

- Blood tests (Phlebotomy). If your GP gives you a printed form for a blood test, then Ely CDC is one of your options. It also does hospital blood tests for Addenbrooke's. You can book a blood test appointment at Ely CDC here: <https://app.10to8.com/book/ely-cdc/>

Ely Minor Injuries Unit (MIU)

As the name suggests, the Minor Injuries Unit provides assessment and treatment for **patients with minor injuries or illnesses that do not require emergency care** at an Accident & Emergency (A&E) department. However, MIUs are not A&E. **If you are experiencing chest pain, shortness of breath, or any life-threatening symptoms, call 999 or go directly to your nearest A&E department.**

MIUs are led by highly-trained nurses and paramedic practitioners, supported by experienced healthcare assistants and administrative staff. They are qualified to assess, examine, diagnose and treat a wide range of minor conditions. Patients should be aware that **no GPs or doctors are based within these units**. Also, **children under two years old cannot be treated at the MIU** and should be taken to your nearest A&E. **The MIU is open 8.30am to 6pm, 7 days a week, including Bank Holidays. However, X-ray times are different: 9am to 4.45pm on Monday to Friday, and 1pm to 5pm on Saturday, Sunday and Bank Holidays.**

The MIU is a walk-in service, but some appointments may be booked through NHS 111. It can treat the following: minor head injuries; limb injuries (fractures, sprains, wounds, burns, bites, stings); minor burns or scalds; simple wounds; minor eye injuries (not including conjunctivitis or anything non-invasive); foreign body removal; minor infections (for example, sore throat, earache); minor abscesses; X-Ray requests.

Energy Developments around Reach – an Update

This note provides an update on the two energy development proposals that will affect the village should they proceed. The Parish Council is monitoring events, which are currently playing out between developers and the Planning Inspectorate.

Grenergy Battery Storage

On 22 May Grenergy appealed ECDC's decision to refuse its planning application for a battery storage scheme on Hightown Drive, adjacent to the 24Acres.

The PC has now written to the Planning Inspectorate, which considers such appeals, reaffirming our opposition to the application and reiterating the harms that the scheme would bring should it be approved.

Whilst national planning policy does not require a 'green' energy developer to demonstrate the 'overall need' for its scheme when seeking planning permission, our letter questions whether this scheme is in the country's or our locality's best interests, given that Government itself has already identified that there is a massive oversupply of battery storage schemes. We therefore suggest that this proposal is unnecessary. Our letter can be accessed on the Reach PC website:

Burwell PC, the National Trust, BEAT and local residents have also restated their opposition to Grenergy's proposal. We don't yet have a date when the Planning Inspectorate will decide this appeal.

Kingsway Solar and Battery Scheme

Kingsway withdrew its application for a Development Consent Order (the type of planning permission required for a project of this size) to the Planning Inspectorate on 17 June. This was just days before the Planning Inspectorate was due to decide whether the application was fit to proceed to public examination. It is clear that the Planning Inspectorate had many reservations about the application and would almost certainly have rejected it had Kingsway not withdrawn it. Kingsway has indicated that it intends to submit a revised application and we understand that this could be within a matter of weeks. There is nothing to suggest that a revised application will address the PC's concerns about the adverse impact of the pylon route that Kingsway proposes to connect its solar and BESS installation to national grid at Burwell. The pylon route threatens the outlook from many parts of the village and would damage the sense of place along the northern end of the Devil's Dyke. The Parish Council Alliance (of which Reach PC is a part) and its team of experts are ready to respond should a resubmission be approved by the Planning Inspectorate. The Alliance continues to assess that its grounds for opposing the proposal are strong. Should Kingsway's re-application be allowed to proceed to public examination, the Alliance will provide guidance as to how individuals can register as Interested Parties and submit comments, known as Relevant Representations, to the process. This will be your chance to voice your concerns directly.

Tales from a Reach Garden

We often have birds nesting in our garden in the various trees, hedges, clematis and grapevine. Besides the robins, various tits, blackcaps, blackbirds (and the inevitable woodpigeons), over the years, we have even had kestrels and buzzards nesting in the garden.



Fortunately, the buzzard nest was in a corner we don't frequent in summer when there's too much to do in the vegetable garden, but we were aware of their nearby mewing calls and flights to and from a telegraph pole behind our house, which they used as a platform for viewing interesting prey and eventually, when the parents called the fledglings together and they all flew off in the direction of Wicken Fen. This year we've also had the joy of listening to the cheeps, whistles, tweets and chatter from a family of goldfinches who we've seen fly in and out of a medlar tree, sipping at the bird bath and resting on the dead branch of an old crab apple.

The small bird bath has drawn in a lot of birds in this very hot and dry weather. We keep the bird bath in the shade and replace the water every day. The smaller, more skittish birds flit in for a sip then dart off; thrushes fly in for a dip and a splash (which they seem to enjoy), but the wood pigeons wallow, while airing one wing at a time apparently unafraid of any potential birds of prey. The buzzards haven't nested in the garden since the telegraph pole was removed a few years ago and the wood pigeons have become more daring.

We had been using water from our water butts to replenish the bird bath, but most of our water butts are empty now and we're having to be sparing with our use of tap water since the hosepipe ban. It's been a challenge keeping our vegetables watered. We never water the lawn nor trees (including the fruit trees) nor the flower beds, except for when they are freshly planted and to help establish their roots, which tends to happen in spring and autumn anyway. There are a lot of vegetables to water by watering-can and we decided that only lettuce would be watered, sparingly, every day. Everything else is watered on alternate days and some - such as the onions and garlic and the new potatoes - we stopped watering altogether once the hosepipe ban was announced. Thankfully we planted most things through fabric mulch which minimizes water loss, so watering on alternate days seems to work. We water the vegetable garden in the morning and the pots (mostly aubergines) in the evening, which happens to be beneficial to us as well as the plants. Irrigation via watering can involves a lot of heavy lifting to hoist the water over the various critter-barriers around the beds. I use a smaller 7 litre can, while Richard uses the 9 litre (2 gallon) one. It involves some awkward body-positioning while aiming the flow of water directly at the base of each plant. My arms and abdominal muscles are looking more toned after a week of watering the vegetable garden alone while Richard and our son Dan were walking in the North York Moors, but oh my shoulders ached!

We lifted the garlic when the leaves died back and they are very puny this year, some bulbs are barely bigger than the cloves that were sown back in spring. We'll have to plant the garlic cloves in autumn to ensure some natural irrigation and bigger bulbs. Most of the onions still have green foliage, but foliage of the early onions is fading and those will be lifted soon. The leaves and stems on the new potatoes were already shrivelled, so most of them have been lifted. It wasn't a bad crop of salad potatoes, but they are more floury in texture than usual.

The climbing beans (Cobra and Algarve) seem to have enjoyed the warmth putting out lots of flowers and lots of beans too. There have been a lot of beans to blanch, a process which uses a lot of water, so we've saved the water in a big bucket and use it to irrigate the pots. Alas, our traditional runner beans have also put out loads of flowers but only started to produce beans when the weather cooled down last week. This is the last year I'll grow them; the beans are very tasty and freeze well, but they struggle in our increasingly hot and dry summers and need too much water to do well.

In addition to the heat, we've also had a lot of wind to contend with this summer, which also dries out plants forcing the roots to take up yet more water. We've been able to protect most of the lower-growing plants, but the taller climbing beans had to cope with a lot of leaves crisping at the edges

The aubergines growing in pots on our patio also had to contend with some northern winds blowing through gaps in the hedges, so the leaves are more cupped than usual. I often add some watering gel to the compost when planting the aubergines in pots, it helps to retain moisture near the roots. We also add a large saucer under the pots to retain water that has percolated through the soil, eventually as the plants mature, the roots are long enough they can take up the water, so when the saucers are dry and the soil surface under the mulch is also dry, we know that the pots need water. The pots are also mulched using either wood chip, gravel or ...corks from bottles of wine. I've been doing this ever since a trip to a café near Stellenbosch in South Africa in 2004, where I wondered about a lot of corks around the base of an ornamental plant in a large pot by the table where we were sitting. Stellenbosch is a town famous for its wine in South Africa, so the source of the corks was obvious, but I was surprised to see so many of them in the pot. When I asked about the wine corks to a waitress attending our table, I was told it was mulch. This made a lot of sense as the good thing about using corks as mulch is that they are easy to remove and reuse when repotting. The one downside is that blackbirds find them fascinating and will flick them out of the way when looking for a tasty morsel in spring. They are easy to replace though and are rinsed and reused and added-to every year; that's over 20 years-worth of corks mulching our pots. Cheers and happy watering!

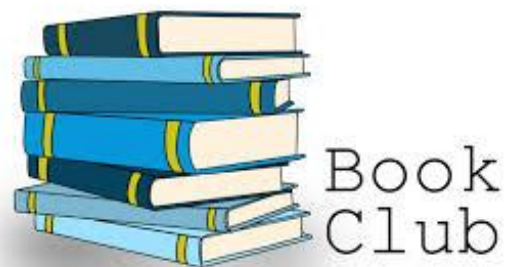

Two committee meetings were held this past month.

Operational Services on 22 June

- Community Safety Partnership report was presented and noted
- Budget report for the previous financial year showed an underspend of £476,084 for the year, but some of this was due to bills not yet paid. The capital spend was also under budget by £5,572,775, but some expenditure was not yet billed.
- Register of Buildings of Local Interest, for buildings or neighbourhoods that were interesting but not meriting a National Grade, was presented and noted.
- Performance Report for the Waste and Street Cleansing Services showed marginal improvement in performance.
- A report on the new waste bin strategy was presented, showing that the service had been delivered quite well, with a few teething problems.

Finance and Assets on 25 June

- The Climate and Nature Monitoring Report was presented and accepted.
- A grant of up to £100,000 from the Community Infrastructure Levy funding was allocated to the Viva Arts and Community Group Theatre in Soham towards the expansion of the theatre to enable larger youth participation and provide enhanced and inclusive welfare and safeguarding spaces to continue to operate with full compliance with the Children in Entertainment Regulations.

1. Planning Applications

Since the publication of the agenda the PC had been informed of two planning applications.

25/00966/VAR Land Southwest Of Hill Farm Fair Green, To Vary Condition 11 (width of access) of previously approved 18/01397/OUT

The PC had previously written to planning “*Reach PC is content that the access is not widened but would like to suggest that a Legal Modification Order be established to detail the legal widths of both byways 7 & 8.*

Additionally, the PC would like to comment on the visual impact of metaling the track and the creeping urbanization of such and oppose this.” Clerk to resend the letter.

26/00537/FUL 12 Great Lane, Installation of replacement windows

Councillors had viewed this application and considered that the windows were in keeping with the cottage & that there was no comment to be made.

2. District Councillor Report

Since the last report we have had only a Full Council meeting. Cllr Pettit was re-elected as Chair, and Cllr Horgan as Vice-Chair.

The most significant change has been the defection of one member of the Lib Dems to Independent, and the creation of a group called the ‘Conservative and Independent Group’ in ECDC, so the two groups are now thirteen and fifteen members. No longer are decisions made on the casting vote of the Chair, but on simple majority on all Committees.

The Administration put up a motion, Future of the A10, on dualling the A10 throughout its length between Ely and the A14; although it would make a difference it was impractical and very unlikely since the Combined Authority would have to provide 15% of the cost, and the Lib Dems argued that the real bottleneck was the junction of the A10 with the A14 which should be the priority and a more realistic solution that could be achieved quicker than a full dualling. One of our two motions was on High Street Bank Closures and Financial Inclusion in East Cambs that was reduced to meaningless platitudes by an amendment; the other, proposed by Cllr Cane MP on Fair access to employment for care-experienced and disabled applicants, was rejected with some Tories citing arguments that clearly demonstrated that they had not fully appreciated what was in the motion; its total rejection was a surprise, and in anticipation of the rejection, Charlotte asked for a recorded vote. The debate can be viewed on YouTube.

Finally, the new bins arrived in Commercial End on Friday 29 May 2026; a close call. Do we know of any missing deliveries in the Parish? Cllr Charlotte Cane MP, Cllr John Trapp

A letter had been received from AW's agents regarding the return of the unused land at The Hythe. Unfortunately, the return of the land is becoming contingent on improved tanker access to the site. The PC has no power to assist with this, CCC highways are responsible. **Councillor Acklam** to reply, reiterating the PC's view that the land was taken from the community and now that it is no longer required it should be returned to the village.

5.11 Energy developments in the locality

Greenergy Battery Storage

On 22 May Greenergy appealed ECDC's decision to refuse its planning application for a battery storage scheme on Hightown Drove, adjacent to the 24 Acres land.

The PC will be writing to the Planning Inspectorate, which considers appeals, reaffirming our opposition to the application and reiterating the harms that the scheme would bring should it be approved. Our position is laid out in our letter to ECDC of August 2025 <https://reachparish.gov.uk/news/objection-letter-to-greenergy-battery-storage>. Furthermore, whilst national planning policy does not require a 'green' energy developer to demonstrate the 'overall need' for its scheme when seeking planning permission, we will also challenge the underlying assumption that this scheme is in the country's or our locality's interests and that its significant harms are therefore acceptable. We can do this on the basis of evidence from government itself which details the massive oversupply of battery storage schemes, and which came to light after our letter of opposition was issued.

Residents have been very clear in their opposition to this application. Those of you who wrote individually to ECDC are encouraged to write to the Planning Inspectorate to confirm that your opposition remains. The PC would welcome (by 22 June and to n.acklam@reachparish.gov.uk please) comments from anybody in the village that might assist the drafting of our letter the Planning Inspectorate.

Kingsway Solar and Battery Scheme

Kingsway submitted its application for a Development Consent Order (the planning permission required for a project of this size) to the Planning Inspectorate on 21 May. The Planning Inspectorate has 28 days to decide whether Kingsway's application is sufficient to allow it to proceed to public examination. Whilst many stakeholders, including the PC and the Parish Council Alliance, have severe reservations about the adequacy of the submission, we expect the Planning Inspectorate to allow the application to proceed. If our expectations are correct, then there will be a 30-day period during which individuals can register as Interested Parties and submit comments, known as Relevant Representations. This will be your chance to voice your concerns directly within the planning process. We will provide advice on how best to do this shortly. Our hope is that the Parish Council Alliance and Kingsway Solar Community Action Group will organise a workshop in Burwell or Reach to assist individual residents.

The PC has already voiced its opposition to this scheme because of the adverse impact of the pylon route that Kingsway proposes to connect its solar and BESS installation to national grid at Burwell. This threatens the outlook from many parts of the village and would damage the sense of place along the northern end of the Devil's Dyke. In October 2025 we wrote to Kingsway detailing our objections to the pylon route and offering a willingness to work with it to develop a less damaging alternative <https://reachparish.gov.uk/download-attachment/4156>. Kingsway saw fit not to acknowledge the letter or to engage with us. Since then, we have not stood still and, as part of the Alliance, have secured legal advisers and independent experts in key technical areas including hydrology, battery energy storage and landscape and visual impact. This expert input will be vital throughout the public examination process and will help ensure local concerns are properly and rigorously represented.

6. **Approve Annual Governance Statement** Agreed and signed.

7. Approve the Accountancy statement

Agreed and signed. Clerk to return the necessary papers to the external Auditor and make the required documents available for public inspection.

8. Play spaces annual inspection report

The annual safety inspection of the playground and swings on The Green had been carried out in May, and a report received. All items on the report were low or very low risk. No items are urgent or would be financially beneficial to do now. Future maintenance costs should be added to the Assets register to allow the PC to plan accordingly.

9. Tree works

A Cherry tree on The Hythe is in poor health; the PC has previously spent money on this tree. Councillor Acklam had been in contact with the ECDC tree officer and concluded that the tree should be felled to open up the area and allow the trees around it to thrive. This will be postponed until September due to the bird breeding season.

10. The cemetery

A complaint had been received about the unkemptness of the Cemetery. Particularly the weeds & grass growing along the front fence and the overgrowth of the cemetery path. However, on making further enquires it seems that about 50% of people who regularly visit the cemetery are happy with the maintenance approach & therefore 50% unhappy. The PC operates a low maintenance regime to encourage biodiversity within the cemetery. There is also an ongoing problem with Muntjac deer getting in and eating flowers. The path has previously been renewed and additional fencing put up. **Clerk** to check what previous work had been done. **Clerk** to also contact the Payback Scheme to see if they are able to assist with weeding and painting the front railings. Working parties, under PC supervision, are also encouraged. **Clerk** to add to next agenda.

11. Parish Council IT

Resident Jake Rote had agreed to become the PC IT Officer, he attended the meeting to discuss actions. Jake has a long history of work in the IT industry and is fully briefed on GDPR requirements. **Councillor Quilter** to draw up a terms of reference so both Jake & the PC understand responsibilities. **Councillor Hall** to liaise and handover.

5.2 Parish Council Members

A traveller camp had arrived on Black Drove – after talks with the CCC liaison officer a notice, to move on, had been served on the travellers. That group have moved on, but waste in piles had been left, notification to ECDC of fly tipping had been reported by a Reach Resident.

Councillor Acklam said that he had received a complaint about an increase in dog poo on Straight Drove and the footpaths of Reach Lode. There did, indeed, seem to be an increase in such deposits which were insanitary and posed a threat to the health of other dogs. The PC agreed to circulate a note reminding residents to clear up after their dogs.

Request from resident – Ditchfield street lighting needs still needs fixing. This has been outstanding since last winter. **Clerk** to escalate with CCC.

5.3 Play Spaces

Discussion took place regarding the new Playground Officers duties. Expectation are that the PC receives an email report each month.

5.4 Rights of Way

Councillors Fielding and Acklam had met with Mark Peck, the County Council's rights of way officer, on 7 July. He hoped to tackle, this autumn, an area of Straight Drove that became water-logged and heavily rutted in the winter. He also agreed to look at a similarly afflicted stretch of Barston Drove. Mr Peck had taken responsibility on behalf of From the Ground Up, to look at the feasibility of the PC's proposal to create a footpath, on County Council land, linking Reach Plantation to the Devil's Dyke. He undertook to come back to the PC once he had spoken to County Farms about existing leases on the land. Mr Peck also acknowledged the poor state of the public footpath linking communally owned land at the north end of Chapel Lane to the Hythe. He undertook to get it cleared and to install an improved walking surface and clearer signage.

5.5 24Acres Committee Nothing to report.

5.6 Friends Of Reach Wood

No report received, however, it was noted that some clearance work has been conducted.

5.7 A to B1102 Group It was reported that consultation is ongoing around the new T4 bus schedule.

5.11 Energy developments in the locality

a. Greenergy. The PC had written to the Planning Inspectorate, which was considering Greenergy's appeal against refusal of its battery storage scheme. The letter had reiterated the PC's opposition to the proposal. The letter emphasised that, since the application was refused, it had become increasingly apparent that additional battery storage was unnecessary and that the proposal was vulnerable to cyber attack.

b. Kingsway. The developer had withdrawn its Development Consent Order Application on 18 June. This was a temporary measure designed to address the many flaws in the application that had been identified by the Planning Inspectorate. A resubmission was expected in a matter of weeks. Councillor Acklam commented that it was unlikely that the developer would be able to address all of the flaws in such a short period. He reported that the Parish Council Alliance and its team of experts stood ready to respond should a resubmission be approved by the Planning Inspectorate. The Alliance continued to assess that its grounds for opposing the proposal were strong.

6. Asset of Community Value

The PC discussed ECDC's decision to reject nomination of land at the north end of Chapel Lane as an Asset of Community Value (ACV). The PC took note of legal advice, paid for by a resident, that a stronger case for registering the land as an ACV could be made. The PC agreed to consider whether it was feasible to take on the additional work involved in a resubmission. It also noted an offer from a resident to pay the legal costs involved in registering the land in the PC's name at the Land Registry. A decision on next steps would be taken at a forthcoming meeting of the PC.

7. The cemetery Payback Scheme will continue to be investigated.

8. The Hythe & Anglia Water

The PC reflected on the disappointing response from Anglian Water which had belatedly made return to the village of land at the sewage works contingent on the PC addressing parking issues that made it difficult for AW's tankers to access the site. The PC considered AW's conditions as both impractical and unreasonable. It was agreed that thought should be given to mounting a media campaign, highlighting the current situation, in a bid to encourage AW to soften its stance. Councillor Acklam agreed to scope the options and costs ahead of the next meeting of the PC. It was noted that Charlotte Cane MP had written to AW to express her disappointment at its stance.
